The Ludwigshafen Dialogue appeals to actors of the economy and the society mainly of the Rhine-Neckar Metropolitan Region. In the foreground of the conference are opportunities and challenges for an intercultural society on the local, national and global level.

The topic of the Ludwigshafen Dialogue in January 2009 is climate change, poverty and equity – climate politics as a test case for a fair and sustainable globalisation.

The discussion on the perils of the worldwide climate change as well as the strategies and instruments of an adequate climate policy is in full swing. The aligned problem of justice is yet widely neglected. Industrialised countries are the main originators of climate change, whereas the poor in the developing countries are especially affected by the repercussions.

A climate policy, that is to be responsible for the containment of the dangerous climate change as well as the necessary adjustments, will have to consider these conflicts of equity, because they already play a decisive role in the international negotiations on climate.

The conference aims at putting the complex challenges concerning the climate in a global context. The central ethical questions will be discussed, which occur in the context of climate change and the struggle against poverty. In the foreground lies the question regarding what are appropriate strategies, technical procedures and instruments of a climate and energy policy, that sustainably support the efforts of the struggle against poverty.
